In doing so, it is hoped that the community will become more sustainable, cohesive and ambitious. The Town Council is the closest level of government to the Community and provides a voice, representing the area at County and Welsh Government level, as well as ensuring other Stakeholders take account of the needs of the Community. Councillors are active within their wards, ensuring that the decisions made by the members reflect those of a diverse community. An annual report is produced and available online summarising the work of the council in the previous mayoral year. The Town Council also appoints school governors and representatives to groups such as the One Voice Wales Area Committee, Bulwark Community Centre, Drill Hall Management Committee, Palmer Centre and Chepstow Chamber of Commerce and Tourism to ensure diversity in the area in which it represents.
