	The present councillors were elected in May 2017 to serve a five-year term of office.
	The Mayor in 2020/21 was Councillor Tom Kirton supported by the Deputy Town Mayor Cllr Dale Rooke.
	Services provided by the Town Council are managed and delivered by a team of six part-time employees, comprising three in administration and four mobile hygiene and asset maintenance operatives. This small team, based at The Gatehouse, is led by a qualified Town Clerk, Lucy Allen who is supported by a Deputy Town Clerk, and Administration Officer. The Maintenance team consists of a Maintenance Operative, two Mobile Hygiene Operatives and two Street Cleansing Operatives.
	The Town Council represents an electorate of 9002 residents.

What is the Council's Vision/Objectives?

Chepstow Town Council is committed to supporting the principles within the Well-being of Future Generations (Wales) Act 2015 in order to improve the economic, social, environmental and cultural wellbeing of communities in Chepstow and in doing so, it is hoped that the community will become more sustainable, cohesive and ambitions. We are committed to providing the best service possible to all our residents, visitors and partners who we see as essential in the future success of the town.

The Town Council is the closest level of government to the Community and provides a voice representing the area at County and Welsh Government level as well as ensuring other Stakeholders take account of the needs of the Community. The Council is able to use powers and resources to respond to the needs of local community groups and local initiatives.

How has the Council embedded the five ways of working into its planning and working arrangements?

Long Term

The importance of balancing shortterm needs with the need to safeguard the ability to also meet long-term needs. The Council has acknowledged that a longer-term view is needed and in 2019/20 agreed that the best way to do this was to undertake a Place Plan for Chepstow with the results being used to develop a strategy and action plan guiding future activities and spend. This will also allow the development of services, projects and initiatives which meet current needs but will embed and improve foundations for future development within our community.

Whilst in receipt of an annual precept, the Council is very aware of balancing short and long-term goals in its budgeting and planning and longer term funding agreements are considered with external bodies ensuring the short and long term needs of the community are met with these collaborations.

	When setting its budget in November the Town Council agrees its priorities and makes resources available from the precept and reserves in order to implement the works identified.
Prevention How acting to prevent problems occurring or getting worse may help public bodies meet their objectives.	The Town Council allocates resources to prevent problems from occurring or getting worse and strives to address problems by prevention and early intervention rather than being responsive. The Town Council welcomes discussions with community stakeholders and is able to work in partnership to provide funding to prevent future problems. In addition, a community grant scheme is available to local organisations who have identified areas of concern and the Town council is able to financially assist to provide a suitable resolution.
Integration Considering how the public body's wellbeing objectives may impact upon each of the well-being goals, on their other objectives, or on the objectives of other public bodies.	The Town Council works closely with a variety of community stakeholders to deliver its actions and strives to have a positive effect on people, the economy, the environment and culture. When making decisions the well-being objectives are considered to ensure the goals are achieved.
	The results of the Place Plan will allow us to develop services and projects across all goals and help us identify where an existing organisation or community group may be able to enrich our delivery, or theirs and achieve greater efficiency through integration.

	The Town Council works in partnership with, and is represented on many groups and organisations as well as supporting many others through its community grant scheme.

The Town Council works hard at building relationships with community stakeholders to assist with the meeting of the Well-Being objectives. Councillors and staff are committed to implementing the well-being goals and objectives and strive to improve the services provided. The Town Council is facilitator in this area and in 20/21 supported a number or organisations, particularly those involved with the Covid response. Partnership working is integral to the Council's work and the Council works closely with organisations such as Monmouthshire County Council, Transition Chepstow, MIND Monmouthshire, Monmouthshire Citizens Advice Bureau and Gwent Police.

OBJECTIVE

Give Children and Young People the Best Start in Life

STEP

- To increase funding to provide for additional provision within the current summer play scheme.
- Working to ensure that schools and services for children focus on well-being and a more rounded approach than purely academic results.
- To tackle the issues surrounding Holiday Hunger.

ACTION	PROGRESS
To provide summer activities for 5 to 11 year olds	Due to the pandemic the usual summer activity changed from being run in three sites to just being run from the Leisure Centre due to the schools being closed. Funding support of £20,000 was made available towards the delivery of open access playschemes and uptake was good. In Chepstow 96% of the paid spaces available on the scheme were booked (the highest proportion in the county) and 66% of the free spaces were booked (this is the second highest in the county). The feedback received from children and parents this year was extremely positive.
	The Town Council also supported MCC with delivery of the Play Packs out to the community.
To tackle the concerns regarding holiday hunger	The usual SHEP (School Holiday Enrichment Programme) scheme was cancelled due to the Pandemic however the Town Council financially supported Mon Housing with their Community Breakfasts and Picnics which provided breakfasts for the week to those attending.

To support those children whose families are impacted by the Covid 19 Pandemic.	The Town Council awarded a grant of £30,000 to the Chepstow Schools' Cluster PTA from the Covid Emergency Funding scheme. This much needed funding was and will be used across all schools in Chepstow allowing for additional support and resources to the many families who have been impacted by the Covid crisis. The main areas of concern within all schools are social isolation, mental health and wellbeing, digital exclusion and lack of provision for warm winter clothing and footwear. The funding will provide additional IT equipment, stationery for those at home who may not otherwise afford these items, warm winter clothing, access to a Counsellor who will be available online to offer wellbeing support and, information on National On Line Safety which will provide information and safety tips to pupils and parents who are spending time at home isolating.
Councillors as School Governor's	Councillors take on this role giving their time, skills and expertise in a voluntary capacity to help their schools provide children with the best possible education.
Community Events	Supports community events and encourages engagement with young people.

To ensure easy access community defibrillators across the five wards of Chepstow	Adoption of phone boxes in Denbigh Drive and Beaufort Square to install public access defibrillators. Installation of a AED (Automated External Defibrillator) outside Chepstow Community Hospital.
Financially supporting the Drill Hall and Bulwark Community Centre which are seen as local hubs of community activity where people can be active and supported	Both Centres received £8,000 in funding in 20/21 with members representing the Council at meetings.
Financial support was provided to a number of organisations supporting older people.	Grant funding was provided to The Palmer Centre to enable them to continue to provide the much-needed service to those who may otherwise be isolated, lonely and unable to meet friends due to the Covid-19 pandemic.
Community Centre reopening post Covid	Supplied all community centres with the required PPE (Personal Protective Equipment)to enable them to reopen safely.

Continued support to the Chepstow Citizens Advice	Enabling residents of all ages to obtain free advice and support on a wide range of matters.

ACTION	PROGRESS
Climate emergency	In October 2019 the Town Council voted to declare a climate emergency and considered ways of reducing carbon dioxide emissions to net zero by 2030. A number of initiatives are being investigated.
Biodiversity	The Town Council secured grant funding to access a 'butterfly garden' package in partnership with Keep Wales Tidy for planting at Chepstow Bus Station. Unfortunately, due to the restrictions in place around the Covid 19 pandemic it has been unable to involve the local primary schools and Transition Chepstow therefore representatives from Keep Wales Tidy planted the area and the Town Council will maintain until such times as restrictions are lifted.
Street Cleansing	The Town Council is working in partnership with Monmouthshire County Council to provide a full street cleansing service to Chepstow. This includes cleaning the Town, emptying waste bins, grounds maintenance, bench maintenance and replacement and any other ad-hoc duties which are required.
Transition Chepstow / Plastic Free Chepstow	Continue to financially support both of these groups.
Litter Picks	The Town Council supports and promotes the litter picks which take place across the town

Monmouthshire County Council's "Give Dog Fouling the Red Card" initiative	The Town Council is currently responsible for the emptying of 35 dog waste bins across Chepstow and work with the County Council under their Give Dog Fouling the Red Card scheme to educate residents about the risk of dog waste
Chewing Gum Littering	The Town Council has installed six Gum Ball Bins at locations found to have gum littering hot spots to encourage the public to reduce gum littering in a way that encourages a circular economy.
Reducing energy bills across all Council owned / managed buildings	The Gatehouse utilities have been renewed with part green energy.
Planning Applications	All planning applications are considered for their environmental impact as well as business requirements and the historic character of the town.
Water Fountains	Investigating restoring the water fountain in the Dell and also the provision of a water fountain at the Riverbank.
Bicycle Racks	The Town Council worked with Monmouthshire County Council resulting in a number of bicycle racks and a bicycle repair station being installed throughout the town and Bulwark to encourage more active travel.
Green Barrier A48	A submission to the Forest of Dean DC for S106 funding to cover the costs associated with installing a green barrier along a section of the A48 to provide a barrier to diesel particulates as well as increasing biodiversity opportunities and reduce water surface run off.
Recycling Bins at Riverbank	Recycling bins are now stored at the Riverbank for use initially during events however this has been extended out to being used throughout the summer months.
Green roof eurobin store	Project ongoing to install a green roof eurobin store.
To increase the use of pollinator friendly planning in the town	Additional planters have been placed throughout the town planted with pollinator friendly plants. The town's floral contractor sources plants from a peat free nursery, reuses hanging basket liners and all soil at the end of the summer is recycled.

Street Cleansing ways of working	In an effort to encourage biodiversity opportunities and support pollinators the County Council has agreed to an area of wild planting at the Riverbank. Additionally, within the Town Crew Street Cleansing partnership agreement MCC will investigate the provision of an electric pick-up truck and non-evasive weed removal.
Energy Survey of the Town	Project ongoing – a survey has been commissioned by the Centre of Alternative Technology (CAT) to deliver a report providing information such as existing baseline and CO2 emissions, existing renewable energy capacity, energy efficiency and renewable energy generation but can be tailored to suit the needs of Chepstow.

ACTION	PROGRESS
Whole Place Plan	Due to the pandemic this project was delayed by a few months. It is however now proceeding with us currently as the stage of inviting community groups to be involved in online stakeholder evens. Residents have also been asked to become involved in shaping the future of Chepstow.
Work with other organisations / local business who bring trade into the area	Relationship with Chepstow Racecourse established with a view of greater partnership working to bring visitors into Chepstow. Grant funding to the Tourist Information Centre allowing them to remain open.
Supportive of events in and around the Town	The Town Council undertake to arrange Bands on the Bandstand every Summer. It supports the events produced by the Chepstow Events Team. Works in partnership with Green Top Events to provide a weekly market between April and December on Sundays encouraging local people to have stalls.

Implementing the Act

An opportunity to reflect on how things are going.

What opportunities have the Council encountered and how have these been best utilised?	The Town Council continues to seek opportunities to make improvements and considers these ideas when setting the budget. Council powers have been utilised to support partnership agreements, replacement litter bins and the provision of notice boards and defibrillators in each ward. COVID-19 has meant that while services were curtailed, through remote working we have been able to continue providing vital services to the people of Chepstow.
Has the Council encountered any barriers and if so what actions have been/are being taken to overcome these?	The disruption by the COVID-19 crisis brought numerous challenges and meant that some of our projects and services were heavily curtailed during the 20/21 reporting period. Barriers have included the need for better joined up working between local stakeholders and the County Council. Actions in this area include increasing partnership working between the County Council and Town Council as demonstrated by the inception of the Town Team. To truly understand the needs of the local community the Council needs the evidence gathered at a local level. It is hoped that the Place Plan will be the vehicle through which this evidence can be gathered through the Community Engagement events that will be carried out as part of the process.
What challenges has the Council faced and what measures have been put in place to overcome them?	The current COVID-19 situation is a huge barrier in how the Town Council continues to actively engage with their local community and enable residents to continue to contact the Council during this time. Measures put in place so far include implementing policies to support home working of both staff and Councillors to keep the Council work moving forward. Shifting meetings to an online platform. Developing the new Town Council website to better engage with the local community.

Are there any matters the PSB could support delivery/progress on?	The PSB could support with greater information sharing and developing a closer working relationship with the Town and Community Council subject to the act. This would then translate to direct action on the ground especially as the services required in relation to the COVID-19 crisis and recovery move forward.
	A more consistent/regular awareness of the work we are doing/seeking to do as a Council would definitely allow for better collaboration between us and members of the PSB where relevant.
	To keep the Town Council informed of any consultation opportunities pertinent to Well Being aims that the Town Council could be involved in to help deliver its Well Being projects.
