## Chepstow Town Council Biodiversity and Resilience of Ecosystems Duty Report 2022

Environment (Wales) Act 2016 Part 1 – Section 6 (duty to maintain and enhance biodiversity and promote the resilience of ecosystems)

- Chepstow is located in south-east Wales in the county of Monmouthshire, with the Wales border with England to its eastern side.
- The River Wye flows through Chepstow. The Severn Estuary runs adjacent to (but outside the boundary of) Chepstow. The area is designated an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. The Wales Coast Path heads west from Chepstow following the entire coast of Wales. The Offa's Dike Path begins in Chepstow and heads north taking you along the entirety of the Wales/England border.
- The town centre boasts a castle and ancient port wall; in the 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> centuries Chepstow was a busy port and shipyard, and some of the historic buildings date back to the 11<sup>th</sup> century.
- The town is very hill which makes active transport difficult for many residents. The town is also bisected by the A48, one of the south wales 'trunk roads', which suffers from heavy congestion resulting in extremely poor air quality. There is a permanent air quality monitoring station sited on the A48 and Chepstow Town Council participate in Monmouthshire County Council Air Quality meetings.
- The M48 (previously the main M4 route) connect Chepstow to the M4 main artery from South Wales to London, and is the location of the Severn Bridge, which was opened in 1966 linking to Gloucestershire on the English side of the River Severn.
- Chepstow Town Council do not own any land, meaning that all biodiversity enhancement must take
  place in partnership with Monmouthshire County Council, and other relevant authorities, such as
  South Wales Trunk Road Agency.
- The population of the town was 12,500 at the 2011 census.
- The precept raised by Chepstow Town Council for the period 2022-2023 is £657,551.
